BEFORE READING Talk together

- Talk about what it might be and why it is flying.
- Look through the book and talk about the pictures.

said there liked blew elephant funny laughed playground rained sorry stay


DURING READING

Enjoy the story together. If your child needs support to read the story:


- Remind your child to sound out and blend unfamiliar words from left to right.
- Look for compound words, where two words create a bigger word, e.g. moonlight.
- If a word is still too tricky, simply say the whole word for your child.
- Re-read sentences to focus on their meaning where necessary.








The children looked up. There was an elephant on the roof.



The elephant looked funny. The elephant was fat.








It was a bad storm. The wind was strong.




It blew the elephant away.




The children went to school. The elephant was in the playground.




The children laughed.




The children told Mrs May. "Look at that fat elephant," they said.
