DURING READING

Enjoy the story together. If your child needs support to read the story:


- Remind your child to sound out and blend unfamiliar words from left to right.
- Look for compound words, where two words create a bigger word, e.g. moonlight.
- If a word is still too tricky, simply say the whole word for your child.
- Re-read sentences to focus on their meaning where necessary.






Wilf and Wilma came to the house. They came to play.




The children went outside. They climbed the tree.




They looked in the tree house. "What a mess!" said Biff.

Biff and Wilma mended the door.




Chip and Wilf painted the tree house.



Wilf painted the door. Chip painted the walls.




The tree house looked good. The children put things inside.

"What a storm!" said Mum.




The wind blew. The rain came down.




"What a storm!" said Mrs May.




It was time to go home. The mums and dads came.




"What a wind!" they said.

"What a mess!" said Kipper.




The children climbed on the tree. Floppy barked and barked.
